Dunston Grange building development

You will recently have received a second letter from Lee Rowley MP with some information regarding the proposed 500 houses off Dunston Road in addition to the 300 already under construction, and advice as to how we can express our views and concerns to Chesterfield Borough Council. In addition, all have received a leaflet from Dunston Grange Residents Action Group asking for our support in writing to the Council. At the time of writing, there have been less than 100 objections and if you have not already done so, please write now before 84 acres of fields and farmland are lost forever, as well as taking on further problems of pollution, a massive increase in traffic that a total of 906 houses (including the Strata ones) and the loss of Cutthorpe's village identity as it edges ever closer to Chesterfield. The current landowner does not live locally and therefore won't be affected in the same way as those of us who will have to endure this for years to come. Also, the action group have now secured the support of Campaign to Protect Rural England to advise. There is still time to write and it only takes a few minutes by email or letter to Chesterfield BC Planning dept. scheme ref CHE/21/00549/OUT. You don't have to go into great detail and every objection adds weight to the cause. Remember also that this is not limited to one per household and that every family member is entitled to write in. Environment

Although this year we have not been able to litter pick the efforts of individuals has kept the village looking tidy, however another problem has come to my attention and that is the increased amount of dog mess left around, particularly on Green Lane, I know most of you are responsible owners but for those that aren't aware dog faeces is not only unpleasant but is a health risk to all, the Giardia parasite can cause illness in dogs and humans so please pick up whether it be road, track, park or field. Also be aware that compostable pick up bags are available to avoid any need to hang them in trees etc. On a more pleasant note we are pleased with the results of the wild flowers and would encourage anyone to plant a wild flower area to help pollinators - we planted a mixture of annuals and perennials and will add to them each year - see Wild flower project update.

Wild Flower Project

Update

The Wildflower Patch created by members of The Men's Shed Group and other



volunteers earlier on in the year appears to have been a success bringing colour into the village and increased wildlife activity. Hopefully the plants will self set this autumn and provide us again with another show next year. Thanks must go to whoever has maintained the grass verge around the wildflower patch this has certainly enhanced that whole focal point in the village.

On an added note there have been some comments about others being interested in turning some of their garden or frontage onto the road into a wildflower patch. Here are just a few tips to get started.

- Remove any grass, which grows too strongrly for the seeds to compete and control weeds by digging or rotavating, burying any vegetation to a depth of 15-20cm. This also brings less fertile soil to the surface.
- Firm and rake the surface to make a seed bed
- Don't be tempted to use fertiliser or manure
- Ideally sow in autumn giving the seed time to settle over winter. If you are on heavy clay its better to wait till spring
- Ensure the seed is scattered evenly mix the seed with silver sand makes the process easier (2g seed with 5g silver sand per sq metre). Rake in lightly and water thoroughly
- Supplies of seeds can be found in Garden centres or online
